## **Idea Stalled in Congress**

On June 10, 1996, the House of Representatives passed their version of the reauthorization of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) HR 3268. This bill restores many of the discretionary programs with which our profession were concerned. Personnel preparation, research, and technology were restored in the House Bill. However, personnel preparation and research programs appear to be combined for the first time in a joint competition. In addition, a new Part C-State Improvement Grants section was added to encourage individual states to fund programs of benefit to their children with disabilities. Portions of the Individualized Education Plan (IEP), such as Annual Goals, Short Term Objectives, and lawyer fee issues were also restored to previous versions of IDEA.

The Senate, however, has failed to come to a consensus in their version of IDEA. It appears that with the busy schedule the Senate will have when it returns from its August recess, there will be little time to resolve controversial issues of IDEA and pass Senate Bill S. 1578.

We should remain alert on these issues as some people in Washington believe that the Senate will make great attempts at passing this bill before their deadline on October 4, 1996.

The House Republican staff has taken an initiative with the Senate to bring both bills in sync so there would be no need for a conference committee between the House and Senate so a simple voice vote could pass IDEA. However, if no compromise or conference committee between the House and the Senate is completed by October 4, 1996, it would appear that IDEA will not be reauthorized until after the 105th Congress convenes.

Considering that IDEA has traditionally been passed as a bipartisan bill in all of its previous reauthorizations, this particular reauthorization is certainly a profound issue for these legislators. Never has IDEA taken two and possibly three congress' to pass this federal law. We need to remain alert as drastic cuts and significant changes to this bill may occur at a moment's notice.

# Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services Funding for FY 1995

In 1995, 27 personnel preparation grants were funded in

adapted physical education with an additional 10 funded in therapeutic recreation. We can assume that there may be an equal number of grants funded but there may be a decrease in these numbers for FY 97. If IDEA is not reauthorized until after the elections of 1996, we can assume level funding at 1995 levels for the 1997 fiscal year.

According to Bokee (1995), in 1995 adapted physical education projects received a total of \$2,323,628 for 27 projects with therapeutic recreation receiving \$1,025,419 for the same period for 10 projects. A total of 22 states were funded with these 37 projects and 386 students in adapted physical education and therapeutic recreation were supported with \$1,804,637 for student support in these training programs. Data have not been released regarding the 1996 competition for CFDA 84,029G program. In upcoming issues of *Government Affairs Alert* we will begin to track these competitions with an attempt to provide funding trends over the previous decade or so to determine priorities within the Department of Education.

# Infrastructure for New State Improvement Grant Initiative of Part C of IDEA

Ms. Martha Bokee, Area Coordinator for the Division of Personnel Preparation, Office of Special Education Programs, U.S. Department of Education, indicates that a multi-disciplinary approach needs to be taken by grant seekers as the pool of federal funds is becoming more and more generalized and competitive.

With Martha's suggestions in mind, several professionals from selected states in the eastern United States have agreed to serve as State Legislative Directors for a new initiative which will pursue state improvement grants as Part C of IDEA is implemented by Fall, 1997. This infrastructure will include adapted physical education specialists, recreation therapist specialists, disability sport organizational heads, i.e., Special Olympics, and community-based leisure service providers.

The purpose of this initiative is to contact state legislators, department of special education members, and Special Education

Advisory Panel members in order to secure the new funds filtering down through Part C funds for adapted physical education and recreation. A message crafted by David Auxter, Research Institute for Independent Living, plays into public policy of health care reduction of individuals with disabilities through meaningful physical activity.

# Special Olympics Initiates International Research Effort

The Special Olympics International, under the direction of Drs. Tom Songster and Tim Davis, Directors of Sports and Recreation, have initiated a research effort to validate the effectiveness and value of regular physical activity among individuals with mental retardation. Through a system of daily activity monitoring which would include formal sport training and leisure activity, the Special Olympics will collect and monitor data as to the effectiveness of regular participation in Special Olympic participation among its athletes. Again, this fits into the public health policy model as presented by David Auxter which focuses on the value of physical activity of individuals with disabilities as a reduction element of health risks as identified by the CDC and Health People 2000 documents.

## Summary of Business Meeting — 1996 NCPERID Annual Meeting

Dr. Gail Webster welcomed everyone and committee reports followed. The treasurer's report indicated that the Consortium is beginning to receive royalties from Human Kinetics for the APENS book. Gail Webster will begin serving as the membership chair in place of Manny Felix for 1996-1997. With regard to liaison reports, Sarah Rich will conduct an information meeting this Fall at the NTRS meeting in Kansas City in order to try to increase Consortium membership. Jim Decker conducted a survey pertaining to membership attrition and results were shared. President Webster announced that Steve Butterfield was resigning as Editor of the Advocate and that a suitable replacement for him will be sought by the new Board. Luke Kelly provided the membership with an update with regard to the upcoming first administration of the Certification examination. Dr. Kelly outlined a strategy by which Consortium members are to be involved in recruiting future examinees. In addition, the Board will work closely with the APENS transition team to transfer APENS to the Consortium. With regard to the Ethics Committee, a survey was distributed which sought the input of the membership relative to sanctions. The survey was to be returned to Geoff Broadhead. As a member of the Ethics Committee, Claudine Sherrill spoke about the importance of the survey and the development of sanctions.

Election results for the 1996-1997 Board of Directors were announced. Bill Vogler was elected vice-president, Sarah Rich was elected the representative for recreation, Monica Lepore was elected the physical education representative, Cathy Houston-Wilson was elected secretary and Laurie Zittel was elected treasurer.

Old business included a discussion and vote regarding the inclusion statement developed by the Consortium membership over the past two years. A motion was made to accept the most recent revision of the inclusion statement. Following a significant amount of discussion, the membership voted not to accept the motion. At this time the Consortium will not have a position statement regarding inclusion.

New business included discussion of the location of next year's meeting. The 1997 meeting will be held in the D.C. area from July 10-12. The further discussion centered around the Consortium developing a home page on the World Wide Web. Lou Bowers offered the use of the University of South Florida for the host site. Peter Ellery agreed to discuss the possibility of developing the page for the Consortium.

# THE WILLIAM A. HILLMAN, JR. DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

**Dr. Jeff McCubbin,** Associate Professor, Oregon State University

Dr. McCubbin receives the William A Hillman, Jr. Distinguished Service Award for his outstanding record of service to improving the quality of physical education and sport for individuals with disabilities. During the past 10 years he has served the NCPERID as: Advocate Newsletter Editor (1986-1988), Elected Board Member (1988-1991), President of the NCPERID (1991-1994), and Executive Committee of the APENS (1993-Present). From 1990-1991 Dr. McCubbin served as the AAHPERD's Chair of the APAC. Dr. McCubbin has authored or co-authored over 50 publications (books, manuals, abstracts, articles) as well as written, directed or co-directed over one million dollars in external grants. He is the coauthor of the very successful textbook, Games, Sports and Exercises for the Physically Handicapped.

# THE HOLLIS FAIT SCHOLARLY CONTRIBUTION AWARD

**Dr. Martin Block,** Assistant Professor, University of Virginia

Dr. Block receives The Hollis Fait Scholarly Contribution Award for his exemplary record of scholarship. In only 6 years Dr. Block's scholarship has had a significant impact on the field in stimulating professionals' thinking on the concept of inclusion. His scholarship includes: I text, I0 book chapters, over 25 referred articles, and over 50 scholarly presentations. He is the author of A Teachers Guide to Including Children with Disabilities into Regular Physical Education, a leading reference in the filed of inclusion and physical education. From 1994-1995 he served as AAHPERD's Chair of the APAC and was Editor of the AAHPERD Position Statement on Inclusion. His service also includes Editorial Board member of APAQ, and Consultant with Special Olympics International where he helped develop their Unified Sports program.

#### **CONGRESSIONAL AWARD**

Martha Bokee, U.S. Department of Education

Martha Bokee is the recipient of the 1996 Congressional Award for her legislative leadership role that has enhanced the quality of physical education/recreation services for individuals with disabilities. For many years she has been a strong advocate and the vital link in representing the NCPERID within the Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services/Division of Professional Preparation. For the past 14 years she has been responsible for the writing and the broad dissemination of annual reports about the Division's efforts in supporting professional development programs that address the needs of infants, toddlers, children, and youth with disabilities in adapted physical education and therapeutic recreation. These annual informative reports have helped to educate over 400 people representing various professional organizations, colleges, and universities about the efforts of adapted physical education and therapeutic recreation programs.

# Disability International Foundation Announces Awards

Disability International Foundation, Grace D. Reynolds, President, presented the Sevier-McCahill Award for Outstanding Service to Youth With Disabilities and the Julian U. Stein, Ed.D., Award for Exemplary Service to Persons With Disabilities at the President's Committee on Employment of People With Disabilities Office on May 10, 1996, during the People-to-People Committee on Disability 40th Anniversary Meeting.

Receiving the Sevier-McCahill Awards were John A Nesbitt, Ed.D., Iowa City, IA; and Ambassador John W. McDonald, D.C. area. Receiving the Julian U. Stein, Ed.D., Award was Matthew Guidry, Ph.D., D.C. area.

John Nesbitt is Professor Emeritus, University of Iowa; President, Special Recreation (for people with disabilities), Inc.; and Director, SRI International Center on Special Recreation. Dr. Nesbitt has worked closely with the Board of Disability International Foundation members since 1966. He is a noted author and lecturer in the field of Special Recreation and Rehabilitation.

Ambassador John W. McDonald is a lawyer, diplomat, former international civil servant, development expert and peacebuilder, concerned about world, social, economic and ethnic problems.

McDonald was chairman of the Federal Interagency Committee for the UN's International Year of Disabled Persons, 1961. He worked with members of DIF on IYDP on a national and international outreach and the UN International Year of Youth Disability Conference at the State Department hosted by the YMCA of the U.S.A. (Grace D. Reynolds, Staff), former Director of the Office of Special Populations.

Matthew Guidry, Ph.D., recipient of the Julian U. Stein Award, served as Deputy Executive Director of the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports (PCPFS). He joined the Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion (ODPHP) Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) as Senior Policy Advisor to the Assistant Secretary for Health in September 1995.

Dr. Guidry worked closely with DIF Board and Advisory Board members during his years with the President's Council Clinics and with many special projects. His ongoing support of work with adapted aquatics, Project FIT and other disability needs is well known.

Dr. John Sevier and Col. William McCahill (USMC Retired) traveled throughout the United States and Hawaii promoting programs for youth with disabilities. They represented the Boy Scouts of America to Project Mainstreaming Activities for Youth, a collaboration of National Youth Agencies and to projects which followed. MAY was a BEH special project funded to the YMCA of the U.S.A. with Mrs. Reynolds Director. Sevier was an educator in PA; McCahill, DC, was CEO of PCEH for 27 years.

Dr. Julian U. Stein, retired educator from George Mason University in Virginia, and formerly Director of AAHPERD (American Alliance Health, Physical Education and Dance). Programs for the Handicapped and IRUC+ worked with all of the projects, material development and training conferences that DIF members have been involved in since the 1960s. He resides in Oliver Springs, TN.

DIF, based in Longview, WA, is a non-profit educational foundation established in 1991 as an outcome of work done by its leadership world-wide.

# HOLLIS FAIT SCHOLARLY CONTRIBUTION AWARD

Individuals nominated must have a distinguished record of scholarly productivity in the area of physical education or recreation for individuals with disabilities including:

- Significant contributions to the knowledge or understanding of physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities.
- 2. Publications in journals and/or books that are widely used or quoted in the field of physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities.
- 3. A significant record of scholarly presentations at international, national, and regional professional meetings.
- 4. Service on the editorial boards and/or as a reviewer of scholarly journals dealing with physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities.
- 5. A service of scholarly/creative works in a specialized area of physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities.

# WILLIAM A. HILLMAN DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Individuals nominated must have an exemplary service record including:

- Elected or appointed service to NCPERID. This includes membership on the governing board, committees, and/or Advocate board.
- 2. Service to other organizations which deal with disabled populations in the same or similar functions as stated above.
- 3. Service on editorial boards and/or reviewer of scholarly journals dealing with physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities.
- 4. Service as community service volunteer involved with programs and/or athletic events for individuals with disabilities. (i.e., Special Olympics, USABA, NWAA, etc.).
- 5. Addresses before educational groups, conventions, media presentations, and other meetings held in the interest and promotion of physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities.

## **CONGRESSIONAL AWARD**

Individuals or organizations nominated must have either a record of effort on legislative reform or contributions which resulted in significant change including:

- 1. Legislative reform efforts on the local, state or federal level in the area of physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities.
- Leadership for legislative actions that enhance and/or protect the quality and quantity of physical education/recreation services for individuals with disabilities.

### **RESEARCH AWARD\***

Individuals nominated must be recognized as a research scholar in the area of physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities including:

- 1. A distinguished record of research systematically directed toward specific questions that has helped advance knowledge in physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities.
- 2. Authorship of data-based articles published in refereed journals or monographs of national significance.
- 3. Research that has undergone refereed review and meets criteria established by academia.
- 4. Research presentations at international, national, and regional professional meetings.
- 5. Direction of student research (thesis and/or dissertation) dealing specifically with physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities.
- \* Recipients of this award may be from other disciplines, but their research must have made a significant contribution to the area of physical education/recreation for individuals with disabilities.
